3. How to Keep Members Active

Below are four tips on maintaining an active Key Club:

Plan a Service Project.

One of the most important things you can do to maintain membership involvement is to plan something where everyone has something to look forward to.

Develop interactive activities.

To maintain an active club, have a productive meeting. What does this mean? Essentially, the more people that show up to the meeting, the more people will be informed, involved, and integrated with club news and plans. Interactive activities can draw people to the meeting. This can include things such as icebreakers and games. The opportunities are endless as long as you have the right mentality!

Change the atmosphere.

Make the club less like a boring thing no one looks forward to. Change it up to where everyone decides they want to go to the meeting set up for that week. They want to participate in activities. Some ways to do this include having a not-so-formal atmosphere bring in guest speakers! Have food for the members during the meeting. This is essential because if the students have the right mentality, the club will undergo periodic success.

Note attendance.

This single action can tie in all the previous advice together. Noting attendance can lead to a system where action leads to rewards. Even if you have a service project, it wouldn't be beneficial if people show up to the service project itself and not the meetings. Using attendance as a point system can encourage participation. It is important to distinguish who is involved in the essence of the club and who is involved in the resume

building aspect of joining a club.

Overall, don't let winter break take down the steam behind what runs your club, what you want to pursue within a club.

All members should pay CI\$15 for the whole club year. The Membership Update Center (MUC) is used to input and update membership information and has been open since September 4th at 11:00 AM (UTC-5). I expect every club from Division 26D to receive the Early Bird Dues Banner Patch.

7. Fundraising Ideas

Host a tournament.

It can be basketball, softball, video game, pool, volleyball—any type of tournament! Have an entrance fee for individuals or teams. Advertising the tournament is the key to success of this event—start at least two months before. Be sure to have great prizes for those who win. You need to give an incentive for people who pay to enter a tournament.

Host a Talent Show

Many organizations host talents show for people to watch. Consider incorporating a television show theme like Dancing with the Stars, American

Idol, So You Think You Can Dance, America's Got Talent, etc. Do not forget to recruit judges! This will need time and serious planning. Just like tournaments, be sure to have good prizes.

Create a calendar

Develop a theme for a special calendar. Approach a printer about offering a discount for printing the calendar and offer the printer advertising on the calendar. After the calendars have been printed, sell the calendars to parents, local businesses, etc. The price of the calendar should cover the printing and allow for more funds to support the club.

8. Running for Higher Office

Proper planning and preparation prevent poor performance.

Whether it's preparing a speech or material for caucusing, it's imperative to make sure that you've taken the time to prepare yourself for what's ahead. This isn't a test you can cram for, but anyone can be your study buddy, and a mirror makes a great audience. Practice being comfortable with yourself and what you have to say. You know you've got this — it's just a matter of convincing everyone else.

Be authentic.

Whatever you decide to go for, you'll likely have competition. With so many things in common, it's easy for the faces and speeches to blend. Forty minutes into House of Delegates and half of your audience may very well be half asleep. Give them something to remember! Worry less about trying to blend in or stick out, and worry more about playing to your specific strengths. Work on showing who you are in a way that's authentic and relatable. After all, who could forget someone as unique as you?

Do study and practice. Don't memorize.

Whether it's speeches or caucus questions, it's often easy to pick out those who know what they're talking about and those who merely have a list of memorized talking points or answers. Just like when you study for a test,

don't prepare specific answers. Instead, review your platform and your Key Club knowledge, and the information will roll off your tongue when you need it. You'll sound much more authentic and prepared. You've got this!

Get ready not to know.

It's going to happen. You'll be standing behind a podium, wearing your best "I want to be your next (insert position here)" smile, and someone will ask a question that you have no idea how to answer. Rather than letting that internal scream out and running for the door, get OK with saying "I don't know." Be prepared to offer a suggestion for self-improvement, and mention how you'll handle not knowing the information in a leadership role as well. After all, you're a candidate, not an encyclopedia.

Get a buddy.

Having someone by your side the entire time is invaluable. Sometimes the pull of endless friends and fun is distracting. You need someone who can help you resist distractions. Find a buddy who will take the awkwardness out of introductions, listen to your ideas and offer moral support when your heel breaks, your tie rips, and your dog eats your speech. All in all, I know you can do this. I can tell you from personal experience that being in any higher office in Key Club is so, so worth it. Don't let fear rule. Reach out to me if you need anything, and show the world what remarkable leaders Key Club has!
